VIII. TEACHING/EDUCATION/EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Chapman University 2 Courses Taught, 2 Courses Developed

1. HSCI420 Health and Spirituality, Interterm 2022 (34 students), Interterm 2023 (20 students). The purpose of this course is to familiarize students with how religion and spirituality are present in formally secular hospitals.
2. HSCI485 Aging and Health, Spring 2022 (30 students), Interterm 2023 (20 students), Fall 2023 (20 students). The purpose of this course is to examine the relationship between growing old and having health problems including health care economics and health services for older adults.

Southern New Hampshire University 8 Courses Taught, 2 Courses Developed

1. PHE-101 Fundamentals of Public Health, Winter 2016 (24 students), Spring 2016 (26 students) Summer 2016 (23 students), Fall 2016 (23 students). This course introduces students to the field of public health: its historical evolution, fundamental theories, concepts and practice in the US, and its core values and ethical principles.
2. PHE-327 Research and Assessment in Public Health, Summer 2015 (5 students). Students in this class developed

the introductory knowledge and skills to apply assessment instruments, data collection, research designs, and statistical analysis to assess need, assets, and capacity for health education programs.

3. CHE-220 Communicable Diseases, Summer 2018 (21 students), Fall 2018 (24 students). Students explore the nature and cause of human communicable diseases based on an understanding of pathogenic, behavioral, and environmental factors through the concepts of pathological process in public health.
4. CHE-300 Methods and Materials in Health Education Fall 2018 (21 students). The goal of this course is to explore innovative, meaningful, and effective teaching and learning approaches and materials in community health education. Students learn about curriculum planning and development, teaching strategies, creative learning resources and materials for workplace and community health education settings.
5. CHE-325 Aging and Wellness, Spring 2015 (22 students), Fall 2017 (15 students), Spring 2018 (27 students), Fall 2018 (15 students), Spring 2019 (28 students), Summer 2019 (26 students), Fall 2019 (27 students). This course allows students to investigate the health characteristics of aging populations and issues impacting quality of life.
6. CHE-329 Aging, Politics, and Policy, Winter 2018 (8 students), Fall 2019 (20 students). This course examines the critical issues and current policies impacting the aging U.S. population including Medicare and family caregiving and introduces current trends in public health.
7. CHE-460 Health Communication, Social Marketing and Advocacy. This course explores the roles of communication and social marketing as indispensable tools in health promotion and disease prevention. **Course developer.**
8. CHE 490 Community Health Capstone Fall 2017 (3 students). The capstone course provides students with the opportunity to integrate and synthesize the knowledge and skills acquired throughout their course work in an original comprehensive paper, and to assess their level of mastery of the stated outcomes of their degree program in community health education. **Instructor and Course developer.**

California Baptist University 6 Courses Taught, 1 Course Developed

1. HSC-460 Planning & Evaluation Health Education Programs, Fall 2016 (12 students). This course addresses the use of planning models and diagnostic techniques to design, deliver, and evaluate health education programs in a variety of settings: school, worksite, medical care, and community groups.
2. HSC-101 Introduction to Public Health, Summer 2017 (20 students). This course introduces public health concepts and practice by examining the philosophy, purpose, history, organization, functions, tools and activities, and results of public health practice.
3. HSC-210 Ethics in Health Care Fall 2018 (24 students). This course provides grounding in ethical theories and principles as they relate to and impact current health care issues and policies.
4. HSC-523 Current Issues in Public Health, Spring 2018 (14 students), 2019 (8 students), 2020 (20 students). This course prepares future public health professionals to draw on knowledge and skills from a variety of disciplines to define, critically assess/evaluate contemporary public health challenges in emergency preparedness and determination of potential funding sources required to meet identified public health needs. **Instructor and redesigned course in 2019.**
5. HSC-316 Public Health Promotion, Disease Prevention, and Intervention, Summer 2019 (30 students). This course introduces approaches to health promotion, disease prevention, and intervention in different settings, using varied strategies, and for different target groups.
6. HSC-590 Research Methods Fall 2019 (4 students). This course is Part I of a two-course capstone sequence wherein students reflect upon, evaluate, and assimilate knowledge and experience they gained by participating in a research project. The course will study different types of quantitative research designs such as experimental, quasi-experimental, and descriptive approaches and students will initiate a research project.
