GAMMA PHI BETA SORORITY SHARES THE LOVE AT LOVE ORANGE DAY

In October, more than 50 members of Chapman's Gamma Phi Beta sorority turned out to support Love Orange Day, an annual day of service that brings businesses, families and individuals together to give back to the community.

"Events like this align perfectly with our organization's focus on philanthropic spirit and community service," says Kassandra Sopko '22, a strategic and corporate communications major and president of Chapman's Gamma Phi Beta chapter. "We saw this as an incredible opportunity to partner with Orange to show our support as members of the Chapman community."

Gamma Phi Beta members participated in various community service activities throughout the day, including volunteering with the TLC Public Charter School Mural Project, the Youth Centers of Orange Fun Run and organizing the Full Circle Meaningful Marketplace donations, the Nature Center Winter Preparation Project, preparing meals for homeless neighbors with Mary's Kitchen, and being a part of the Love Orange Kick-Off Team.

"Everyone was genuinely excited to participate, and many members expressed that they will be continuing to volunteer with the organizations in the future," says Sopko. Members shared photos and videos throughout the day representing Gamma Phi Beta and Chapman to the community.

Philanthropic spirit and community service are important areas of focus within Gamma Phi Beta; the sorority requires hours of service as a standard of membership. Along with local service projects, the sorority hosts two large-scale philanthropic events each year with proceeds benefiting two local nonprofits, Girls on the Run of Orange County and Camp del Corazon.

CHAPMAN STUDENT COMBINES PASSIONS FOR TEACHING AND COMMUNITY BUILDING

As a student at Chapman University, Maya Yesharim (BA '21 and MA '22) discovered a passion for building community while undertaking fieldwork in local Orange County schools. While still an undergraduate, Maya founded Students Help Students, a tutoring company that allows her to utilize her teaching experience while giving back to the community.

While pursuing her degree in Integrated Educational Studies (IES) from Chapman's

Attallah College of Educational Studies, Maya worked as a teacher's assistant and for Chapman's First-Generation Programs. She also added a minor in Leadership Studies and is currently pursuing a Master of Arts in Leadership Development.

Maya started Students Help Students, now in its second year, during the COVID-19 shift to remote instruction. As an experienced tutor, many parents were reaching out asking for her services during these difficult circumstances. She also knew that there were many college students from Chapman and other local universities who were looking for work.

The company matches tutors with subject-matter expertise to K-12 students in Orange County based on the children's needs. Most of the Students Help Students tutors are Chapman undergraduates or graduate students, with specialties that include math, language arts, history and science. In the past year, Students Help Students has been able to help more than 70 students with tutoring and school supplies.
