STUDENTS MIGRATING TO NEW UNIVERSITY HOUSING

Just as 721 students were moving into the new Chapman Grand apartments in Anaheim in August, the wood framing for the new residence hall under construction at the corner of Palm Avenue and Cypress Street in Old Towne Orange began to rise from its foundation.

Next fall, about 400 students will call the new Villa Park Orchards residential village at that site home. The historic 1918 Villa Park Orchards Association Packinghouse next door is being adapted with a restored exterior, and two auxiliary sheds were saved and moved about 800 feet to accommodate the location of the new residence hall.

The projects represent Chapman's dedicated efforts to place more students in University housing because of community concerns about student rentals in the City of Orange. Chapman also purchased the West Chapman Avenue complex now known as Panther Village in 2013. The Chapman Grand apartments in Anaheim's Platinum Triangle were purchased and retrofitted by the University earlier this year. That complex has a capacity of 900 but is limited to 750 students in its first year.

Construction on the Villa Park Orchards residential village is about 25 percent complete. The building will have brick, metal and stucco façades that blend with the historic industrial character of the neighborhood and are reminiscent of Chapman's nearby Crean Hall, the former Western Cordage Building built in 1923.

NEW STUDENTS FIND COMMON GROUND AT CYPRESS STREET SCHOOL

Inside the last standing formerly segregated "Mexican school" in Southern California, 21 new Chapman students learned about the past of the community they are joining from members of the Orange Barrio Historical Society.

The students who visited the renovated schoolhouse - now owned by the University - were part of the Common Ground track of Chapman's Emerging Leaders early-orientation program for first-year students offered by the Office of Residence Life and First Year Experience. The group spent a day and a half on Aug. 19-20 visiting local sites and learning about area history such as Mendez v. Westminster, the landmark federal court decision that ended segregation in Orange County public schools. The students also met Orange Mayor Teresa

"Tita" Smith and visited Santa Ana, where they discussed gentrification and other issues.

"It's focused on educating students about Orange beyond what they might have thought about, the beaches

and Disneyland," said Negeen Lotfi, program coordinator in Chapman's Office of Student Engagement. "It's about community relations and civic engagement."



Did You Know?

About 450 Chapman students living off campus received copies of the new pamphlet, "The Panther's Guide to Living Off Campus: Being a Good Neighbor in Your Community." It includes tips on parking courteously, picking up trash and bringing in garbage bins promptly, developing relationships with neighbors and how to be considerate when hosting a gathering. The publication from Chapman's Office of Community Relations also includes important local phone numbers and a guide to donating unwanted items and arranging for pets when moving out.
