Chapman University IRB Guidelines for the use of Raffles/Drawings in Research

The Chapman University Institutional Review Board (CUIRB) requires that protocols using raffles as drawings must follow the guidelines below. There are particular Internal Revenue Service requirements that need to be adhered to when offering raffles. Please incorporate these guidelines into all submissions that use raffles.

California state law (like many other states) places restrictions on the use of raffles. As a general rule, participation in a raffle cannot be conditioned on providing some form of consideration (usually the consideration is money). For example, raffles often have language stating that "no purchase is necessary" in order to participate. Again, this is because individuals cannot be required to provide consideration in order to be eligible to participate in the raffle.

Applying these statutory requirements to a research project, the following is required:

- 1. Do not preclude individuals who either refuse to participate in the research project or fail to complete the project, from participating in the raffle. In other words, it must be clear to individuals who are eligible to participate in the research project (i.e., survey) that they do not have to participate in the project in order for them to be eligible for the raffle.
- 2. Place specific language in your informed consent that it is not necessary for a subject to complete the project (i.e., survey) in order to participate in the raffle.
- 3. If individuals who are not invited to participate in the research ask to be included in the raffle (not likely in most scenarios), you must include them.
- 4. The CUIRB will review the raffle for purposes of determining whether the prize could be construed as "coercive."
